
### Information




### Education

This only works when people start from the same place, history and set of circumstances.


#### Equity = Justice


Equity is about fairness, and providing people with the resources and opportunities they need, given their history and set of circumstances.



## The Dresden School House Built by freed slaves






### African-Methodist Episcopal Church Built by freed slaves who fought in the war of 1812

### **Transformation**

- Do you have an anti-racist policy in the City/Region?
- Do you have an anti-Black racism policy or strategy in the City/Region?
- Do you have concrete policies that reflect diverse voices?
- Do you have a 5-year or 10-year plan for the City/Region that includes transformative policies to include an anti-racism framework and an equity-lens?
- Does the staff in your City or at the Region reflect diversity?
- Have you discussed ways that you can be more inclusive within your programming?
- How do staff provide feedback on how you can do things better?
- How do residents provide feedback on how you can do things better?
- Do you find ways to insert diverse voices at City events, projects? Services?
- Who do you hire for DEI training?
- Do your consultants reflect racialized communities?
- Do you consultants reflect the Black community?
- Do the experts that you hire reflect Black business owners?
- When you plan concerts and events do you include Black performers, MC's, event planners and vendors?
- Do you have staff that reflects the community it serves?
- Do your assistants, front-office staff, receptionists reflect the diversity of the Region?


Change leads to disappointment if it is not sustained. Transformation is sustained change, and it is achieved through practice.


