


WHAT IS DRIVING DEMAND AND RESOURCE NEEDS?



Population growth

- Population growth is expected to grow by 1.67% per year or 303,800 people by 2031
- As the population grows, call demand increases



Aging population

- By 2051, 23% of York Region residents will be over age 65, with the most significant growth expected amongst older seniors aged 75 and older
- Demand is expected to increase by 6.8% annually, which is expected to outpace the population growth forecast



Increasing urbanization and density

- Intensification in higher density areas and transit-oriented communities will increase demand on emergency services
- Population growth also expected in rural areas; Town of East Gwillimbury population forecasted to increase by 136.5% between 2019 to 2031

Response to life threatening requests within 8 minutes, 70% of the time Regionwide including all local municipalities









FUTURE CONSIDERATIONS AND ADVOCACY







- New Medical Priority Dispatch System will reduce unnecessary lights and sirens calls and make more efficient use of resources
- Clinician-based call diversion for low priority 911 calls would divert calls to appropriate health resources

- New models of care will improve the patient experience, maximize paramedic resources and health system efficiency
- More patients diverted from hospitals would reduce unnecessary transports to hospital and paramedic time spent at hospital overall
- Sustainable funding and a legislative framework for Community Paramedicine programs will assist program delivery and reduce pressures on the health care system
- Community paramedics improve access to preventative care in the community reducing 911 calls

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Council approve the Paramedic Services Master Plan, 2021 2031 included as Attachment 1 to this report.
- 2. The Regional Chair write to the Provincial Minister of Health advocating for expedited rollout of the following: dispatch modernization, new models of care (such as treat and release) and sustainable funding for community paramedicine programs.
- 3. The Regional Clerk circulate this report for information to local municipalities, local hospitals, three Ontario Health Teams in York Region and the Minister of Health.
