1 Introduction

In August 2019, Archaeological Services Inc. (ASI), Nbiising Consulting, and Incite Planning were retained by the Regional Municipality of York to facilitate engagement of First Nations and Métis regarding its Municipal Comprehensive Review (MCR) to update the York Region Official Plan (ROP). As part of the Region's MCR, this was extended to include the Water and Wastewater Master Plan (WWMP) in November 2019 and the Transportation Master Plan (TMP) in December 2020.

The Indigenous engagement program for the York Region MCR project followed the approach of separate and direct engagement with rights-bearing First Nations and Métis. A list of Indigenous communities or nations that have established or potential Aboriginal or Treaty rights within the Regional Municipality of York, or who have an established interest in the Region, has been consolidated from several sources, including contact lists maintained by York Region, ASI and recommendations from the Ontario Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks. Based on these criteria, 13 nations or communities were contacted about the project:

- Chippewas of Rama First Nation
- Curve Lake First Nation
- Georgina Island First Nation
- Hiawatha First Nation
- Haudenosaunee Confederacy Chiefs Council
- Huron-Wendat Nation

- Métis Nation of Ontario (Georgian Bay Métis Council)
- Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation
- Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation
- Six Nations of the Grand River

1.1 Background of First Nations and Métis Engaged

Anishinaabek. York Region lies partially within the territory of Anishinaabe peoples, specifically the Chippewas and Mississaugas who have occupied this region since 1690. These nations signed the Williams Treaty in 1923. They are:

- Alderville First Nation
- Beausoleil First Nation
- Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation
- Chippewas of Rama First Nation
- Curve Lake First Nation
- Hiawatha First Nation
- Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation

Mississaugas of the Credit. York Region lies partially within the Toronto Purchase, Treaty No.13, signed with the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. It also occupies part of the Rouge River Claim submitted in 2015.

Haudenosaunee. The nations of the Seneca, Cayuga, Onondaga, Oneida, Mohawk and Tuscarora have historic ties to this region and specific agreements with the Crown. They are represented by:

- Six Nations of the Grand River Elected Council
- Haudenosaunee Confederacy Chiefs Council Haudenosaunee Development Institute

Huron-Wendat. York Region is entirely within the territory formerly occupied by the Wendat Confederacy. The ancestors of the Huron-Wendat occupied York Region for millennia until they moved north to Wendake around A.D. 1600. They were dispersed by the Haudenosaunee and left Ontario in 1649. They are represented by the Huron-Wendat Nation.

Kawartha. The Nishnawbe are akin to the Anishinaabek and have a similar claim to the same territory. Though the community is unrecognised by the federal government, the courts have acknowledged them as signatory to the Rice Lake Treaty (Treaty 20) in 1818. They are represented by the Kawartha Nishnawbe First Nation.

Métis Nation of Ontario. The Métis have historic ties to the Georgian Bay region via the fur trade and often settled along the shores of the Great Lakes and associated waterways.

Indigenous peoples residing in York Region. In the 2016 census, close to ten thousand people living in York Region claimed North American Aboriginal origins. Of those, 5,915 identified as First Nation, Métis, or Inuk. As York Region does not have the equivalent a Friendship Centre, these peoples may have been engaged on the projects through existing public engagement channels.

2 Notices and Updates to all First Nations and Métis

In total, there have been sixteen notices or updates circulated to all First Nations and Métis as it relates to the York Region MCR, WWMP and TMP. This includes a formal Notice of Study Commencement for each project, informal updates at critical points in the project in order to provide First Nation and Métis contacts with new information as it became available (Table 1) and Notices of Study Completion (anticipated mid 2022). All notices and update emails are provided in Appendix A.

3 Specific Correspondence with First Nations and Métis

In addition to the notices and updates sent to all First Nations and Métis, York Region and the ASI/Nbiising/Incite team corresponded directly with designated contacts for each of the First Nations and Métis identified in Section 1. These individual points of contact included emails, phone conversations and in-person meetings. Individual correspondence for each community is presented in Appendix B. All emails and meeting minutes are on file at Archaeological Services Inc. and at York Region.

4 Engagement Summary

The following eight nations chose to participate in consultation:

- Alderville First Nation
- Chippewas of Rama First Nation
- Chippewas of Georgina Island First Nation*
- Curve Lake First Nation
- Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation
- Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation
- Six Nations of the Grand River
- Huron -Wendat Nation

While some communities have chosen not to respond, this does not imply any sort of agreement or disagreement with York Region's plans. It may represent a lack of time, capacity, concern, or deference to other interests.

In-person meetings were held with the following nations (prior to the pandemic):

- Curve Lake First Nation with Hiawatha First Nation
- Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation

Engagement continued through the pandemic and meetings moved to a virtual format. Virtual meetings were held individually with the following nations:

Curve Lake First Nation

The meetings were 1.5 hours in length with Bob Goulais of Nbiising Consulting acting as facilitator. The meetings began with a presentation on the ROP, WWMP and TMP by York Region staff and involved lively dialogue and questions throughout. One additional meeting was held with Six Nations of the Grand River as it was determined that more time was required for discussion. Meeting minutes are available in Appendix C.

4.1 What Was Heard

Generally, those engaged expressed concern regarding environmental protection, the sacredness of water and the health of Lake Simcoe. More specific comments are summarized in Table 2 below.
