

Context Setting


York Region's population is aging rapidly



Growing 65+ population will impact programs and services






York Region seniors are culturally and ethnically diverse




of York Region seniors are born outside of Canada

- Tamil


Newcomer Seniors


Of 53,495 newcomers who settled in York Region, approximately 5,400 were seniors

Owners vs Renters






Seniors Living Alone in Private Households

The share of seniors among those living with low-income is growing






