



Key Takeaways

Growth Trajectory

Like many North American cities, York Region's population experiencing homelessness will continue to grow without interventions to manage it

2,100-2,300 experiencing homelessness by 2030

The 2,100-2,300 estimate of people experiencing absolute homelessness by 2030 is on the higher end but the increase is generally in line with those reported in Canada's largest cities
