# in Review

## OVER 700 RESIDENTS SIGNED UP FOR HYI ALERTS

As part of Housing York's 2018 summer student employment program, residents were invited to register for HYI Alerts, a notification system that enables Housing York to provide timely building updates to residents by phone, text message or email. Residents can also designate a family member to receive messages on their behalf.

Residents who sign up for HYI Alerts receive real time updates about things happening in their buildings. With HYI Alerts, we can let residents know if a power outage is part of a short term emergency building repair or an area wide disruption and when power is likely to be restored.

Thanks to enthusiasm of the four summer students and the staff supporting them, more than **700 households** registered to receive HYI Alerts!



Residents at Orchard Heights in the Town of Aurora took part in the Community Champion Program. The program tracks building energy performance to help lower utility bills and contribute to environmental awareness and energy conservation through small, everyday life changes, such as keeping windows closed during the winter months.

Every Bite Matters is an initiative delivered by 360°kids that provides youth living in York Region with culinary training to prepare and serve meals.

Youth prepare meals in a commercial kitchen located in the 360°kids space and serve the meals in the sixth floor resident lounge to seniors living in the Richmond Hill Hub. The program has served over 730 hot meals to Richmond Hill Hub seniors and supported 16 youth in achieving ongoing employment.



## PROVIDING PROGRAMS AND SERVICES THAT ARE IMPORTANT TO OUR COMMUNITIES

Housing York works with many partners to provide programs and services. In 2018, twenty-five community agencies, such as York Regional Police, 360°kids, and the York Region District School Board, helped deliver a variety of programs such as after school programs, fitness classes and English as a Second Language (ESL) classes. Housing York also hosted information sessions, such as fire safety programs and events where residents can connect with their neighbours. In 2018, over 90 different programs and events were offered across Housing York communities.



Housing York facilitated nearly **30** health, safety and wellness programs, over **40** community events and **20** educational workshops and programs to support and connect residents in healthy and inclusive communities.



The YOUTHink video contest invited youth aged 25 and younger living in Housing York communities to submit a one-minute video that highlights who they are and what they want to do in the future. To celebrate the YOUTHink participants, Housing York hosted an awards ceremony in January 2018. Participants and their families enjoyed a fun-filled evening with winning videos played on the big screen. Eight finalists went home with great prizes.


In 2018, preliminary construction design work began on the new affordable housing for seniors in Unionville. The project is anticipated to be completed in 2022.



Looking Forward:

*Here we grow again!*






