THE SMOKE-FREE ONTARIO ACT, 2017

- Prohibits access to tobacco and vapour products by persons under 19 years of age
- Restricts display, handling and promotion in tobacco and ecigarette retailers
- Prohibits smoking and vaping (including cannabis) in many places where it can affect the health of others and normalize the behaviour for youth and children
- Supports people in their efforts to quit smoking and vaping

TOBACCO ADDICTION



PROHIBITED PLACES OF USE UNDER THE SFOA, 2017

Smoking and vaping of tobacco and cannabis, whether for recreational or medical purposes, is prohibited in the following areas:

- Enclosed workplaces
- Enclosed public places
- Restaurant and bar patios (+9m)
- Indoor common areas of multi-unit residences, hotels, motels and inns
- Hospital properties
- On or within 20m of;
 - School properties
 - Community centre properties
 - Public playgrounds
 - Outdoor municipal sporting areas



SFOA REQUIREMENTS FOR MULTI-UNIT RESIDENCES (HYI)

Enclosed common areas required to be smoke and vape-free:

- Laundry rooms
- Games and recreation rooms
- Gym areas
- Hallways, stairwells and elevators
- Underground or enclosed parking areas

Areas not required to be smoke and vape-free include:

- Outdoor areas of multi-unit residences and assisted housing, including:
 - entrances
 - parks, beaches and trails (some bylaws cover these)
 - sidewalks
 - parking lots

SUBSIDIZED HOUSING POLICIES AND BYLAWS — A LOCAL SCAN

- Smoking policies vary across the province
- Neighbouring municipalities have implemented similar policies within their subsidized housing units
- Commonalities include:
 - Smoke-free units using a grandfathering system
 - Policy prohibiting smoking within a prescribed distance from entrances, exits and windows
 - Toronto and Peel have implemented municipal bylaws restricting smoking; Barrie and Durham have not

SUBSIDIZED HOUSING POLICIES AND BYLAWS — A LOCAL SCAN

Housing Provider	Policy	Municipal Bylaw
Peel Region	Smoke-free units using a grandfathering system	Regional bylaw with a setback of 9m from any entrance or exit of a municipal building, including Peel Housing Corporation buildings
Toronto Community Housing Corp.	Tenant consultation underway for a policy on smoke-free units with a grandfathering system	Toronto bylaw prohibits smoking within 9m of all residential building entrances and exits
Barrie Non- Profit Housing	Smoke-free units using a grandfathering system Prohibits smoking within 9m of entrances, exits and windows	No municipal bylaw that includes social housing properties
Durham Region Non- Profit Housing Corporation	Smoke-free units using a grandfathering system Prohibits smoking within 5m of entrances or exits	No municipal bylaw that includes social housing properties
Housing York Inc.	Smoke-free units using a grandfathering system. Prohibits smoking within 5m of entrances, windows and vents.	No municipal bylaw that includes social housing properties

York Region Public Health supports:

- smoke-free units for HYI properties
- using the grandfathering system
- HYI's current smoking policy
- tobacco cessation supports

SUMMARY

- The Smoke-Free Ontario Act provides specific limitations on where smoking and vaping of tobacco and cannabis, whether for recreational or medical purposes, is prohibited and not prohibited
- Under the Residential Tenancies Act, an individual cannot interfere with the reasonable enjoyment of others
- Public Health provides smoking cessation programs to York Region residents to assist them with moving towards a smoke-free lifestyle
